THE NATIVE NUDGE Hepatica americana Round lobed hapatica



This petite beauty features large basal leaves with three rounded lobes and light blue to lavender (occasionally white) anemone-like flowers (1/2 to 1" diameter). They appear singly on stalks rising 4-8" tall. Flower stalks emerge from a tattered clump of leathery, burgundy-brown leaves from the previous year, with the new leaves emerging only after bloom has occurred. The round-lobed part of the common name is in reference to leaf shape.

Plant this sweet flower at the edge of a woodland garden in part shade. It is likely to reseed and after a while you'll have a pretty patch of blue. It is also good in shaded areas of a rock garden. It blooms late winter to early spring providing early nectar for bees.

In the spring, just in time for the plant sale, they will send up healthy new shoots and leaves and flowers and we will all benefit from them at our annual fundraiser. (Editor's note): I discovered two Calicarpa, American Beautyberry growing under a bird feeder. I watched them grow for a while until I could recognize it (actually Google was a big help). They are now in two large pots happily growing and even have ber-



ries on them. A new home is in their future and a bit of income is in ours—all thanks to the birds.

Next they leveled the ground and installed a sprinkler system, kept dogwood and crape myrtles and began to experiment with a variety of trees, shrubs and perennials to see what worked. The daylilies and George Tabor azaleas make a beautiful display during their bloom season. In the front yard, under an original dogwood, the Morans have a lovely shade garden with ferns and hostas. Kevin uses stones to good effect as borders to the flower beds allowing him to change the borders easily with out digging up plants.

Interesting fact: they have 13 sweet gum trees which they have never thought of cutting down. They provide magnificent shade and provide lovely autumn color. Yes they do shed the sweet gum balls, but for the Morans who have lived in this house for 20 years, the trees are worth the effort.


Dunwoody Garden Club Sponsors A Presentation by Doug Tallamy Saturday, October 25th


Doug Tallamy, an American ecologist, conservationist, University of Delaware professor of entymology and Wild Life Ecology and author of several books is one of the leading voices in conservation. He has inspired a national movement to restore biodiversity through native plantings. He is reshaping how gardeners view their role in supporting wildlife. The Dunwoody Garden Club invites us to hear his compelling message on how each of us can help heal the planet, starting right in our own backyards.
